WELCOME TO VISBY, GOTLAND, SWEDEN

Visby is located on the island of Gotland in the middle of the Baltic Sea. Gotland is approximately 75 miles (121 km) long and 35 miles (56 km) wide. While the Swedes go to Gotland for sunny holidays by the Sea, most North Americans are more interested in the old walled city of Visby.

Visby is a town meant for walkers. At the end of the 12th and during the 13th century, the walled city of Visby rose to the highest point of power as the seat of the Hanseatic merchants and as the trade center of Northern Europe. Seventeen churches sprouted up during its heyday. Step-gabled houses were built of stone, and the townspeople lived in splendor. It was soon ransacked by Danes, however, and the city subsequently declined. It has only recently become a tourist center, after it was recognized as a treasure house of medieval art, becoming the number one spot in all of Scandinavia for those seeking the charm of the Middle Ages.

GOING ASHORE TODAY?

The Maasdam is expected to anchor off Visby, Gotland at approximately 12:00 noon. Once the ship has been positioned and cleared by the officials, we will begin tender operations. When you are absolutely ready to go ashore, collect a tender ticket from the Cruise Staff in the **Wajang Theater**, **Deck 7**. Please remain comfortable anywhere on board where you can hear the public address system, or in your cabin (listening to channel 4 on your cabin radio) until your tender ticket number is called. Access to the tenders will not be permitted unless you have the proper tender ticket. If you are on a tour which meets in the **Rembrandt Lounge**, **Deck 7**, **DO NOT** collect a tender ticket. Please go directly to the tour meeting location. Please remember to carry your Guest Identification Card to swipe through the security system upon departure and return



ortunately for Holland America Line's passengers, it is best to arrive in Visby by sea. As the ship nears land, the city's solid medieval turrets and old walls come slowly into view, and Gotland's magic is at its most powerful. The largest island in the Baltic, it is one of Sweden's most interesting historical places.

Archaeological evidence of a settlement at Visby dates back to the 9th century, the beginning of the Viking era. The Swedish mainland is only about 60 miles to the west, but Visby, on the northwest coast, receives favorable currents and its port is generally open in winter. An excellent example of a fortified medieval commercial city, it retains many historic buildings, and because of their age and architecture, the city has been named a UNESCO World Heritage site. Many valuable archaeological relics have been unearthed across the countryside as well as in Visby itself, and many more were never buried in the first place. More than 90 island churches have been in continuous use since the Middle Ages.

Modern Visby is the administrative center of the Swedish County of Gotland. In summer, restaurants and bars are busy serving vacationers and residents alike. Many people take daytrips from the mainland aboard one of several ferries that serve Gotland.

Between the 9th and 11th centuries, Gotland was one of several major starting points for the many Viking expeditions that were dispatched in search of new lands. Most headed along the eastern route to *Gårdarike*, the Viking name for Eastern Europe and Russia. Gotlanders were known for their skill as pilots, and they knew the best ship-hauling sites on the route. They were also known for the strong beer they carried on their voyages. The drink seemed to make rowing easier and more efficient, and it gave Gotland's ships extra speed and maneuverability.

The name *Viking* first appeared in foreign writings in the 11th century. The word probably came from the Swedish word *vik* (inlet), and illustrates the close relationship between Vikings and the sea. They had their own Gods, and were feared throughout Europe. Though they were known as wild, drunken, merciless robbers, only a small number of them probably were truly so wild. The Vikings were mainly concerned with farming and commerce, but their missions sometimes decayed into piracy. In fairness, it must also be said that some journeys were launched for the sole purpose of raiding wealthy ports.

Swedish Vikings were a distinct breed from the Danish and Norwegian variety. While the Danes and Norsemen ventured westward, the Swedes looked to their eastern neighbors, venturing first to Russia and then even as far as Asia Minor. Archaeological evidence suggests that there was much trade between Gotland

and the Near East. The Swedish Vikings contributed to the bloodlines of the Russian people, and it has been suggested that even the name of the vast country is taken from *Rus*, one of the names applied to the Viking explorers.

The Middle Ages were probably the island's most important period. Visby had become an important trading city, having overshadowed all other ports along the Swedish coast. At the time, traveling merchants customarily gathered in guilds and formed small cartels. Traveling associations of Germanic merchants were known as *hansas*, (communities). Drawn by lucrative trading opportunities, foreign merchants began to settle on Gotland, and by the end of the 13th century, Visby was a thriving Hansa. Trade with the Hanseatic League in the following century increased its fortunes dramatically.

As gatekeepers to valuable Nordic commerce, Visby businessmen amassed vast collective fortunes. The community was the only one on the island that was permitted to trade with the Germans under the rules of the league, but Germans were not the only foreigners that found their way to Gotland. Russians and Danes also immigrated and established communities of their own. Unfortunately, it was not long before pirates noticed the riches, and the island suffered several major raids. Perhaps piracy begins at home – local leaders were often corrupt, and imposed massive taxes upon the citizens. Many people went bankrupt after paying exorbitant levies.

Gotland's bounty ended abruptly in the 16th century for several reasons. First, the nation of Sweden was born when Gustaf Eriksson-Wasa, an aristocrat, was elected King Gustav I Wasa. In a deal stuck with the Hanseatic League, Gustav was assisted to the throne in return for offering exclusive rights to Swedish commerce. Soon after assuming control, Gustav realized that the Swedish market was a great treasure, so he barred the Hanseatic traders. This turned out to be a grave error. The Swedish economy soon fell apart without support of the powerful Hanseatic League.

Gotland's troubles had begun much earlier however. In 1350, plague visited the island after it had already ravaged most of Europe. The weak and shattered community was an easy target. Danes invaded in 1361, followed by pirates and a contingent of Teutonic Knights. Lübeck also launched an attack in 1525, and Visby declined soon afterward. The island deteriorated for some years, but a new wave of prosperity saw a renaissance in the 18th century.

Much remains from the so-called "glory years." Among the most popular places, Medieval Visby is the main attraction, but Stora Karlsö, Storsudret, Östergarnslandet, Fårö,

Lummelundagrottorna, and Kneippbyn och Tofta just south of Visby are also interesting. There are museums in Visby, Krysmyntagården (just north of Visby), Bungmuseet and Bläse Kalkbruksmuseum.

Gotland's attractions are not only historical – the island also has excellent beaches and resorts. The island enjoys many hours of summer sun, and autumn weather is generally still favorable. Gotland's beaches are also popular for swimmers, and its natural beauty is unsurpassed. Look for unique rock formations known as rauks. Summer is the most active season, when many festivals and organized events occur. The Shakespeare theatre at the ruined monastery in Roma, Chamber Music Week and Medieval Week at the beginning of August are probably the best known.

GUTASAGEN

No discussion of Gotland would be complete without mention of the *Gutasagen* (Gotland's *saga*). According to the legend, the enchanted island rose from the sea each evening at twilight and sank beneath the waves again at dawn. A man named Tjelvar broke the spell when he brought fire to the island. Though some people believe in the letter of the tale, most agree that it is a myth. Scientists have shown, however, that Gotland did indeed sink beneath the sea several times during its history due to changing sea levels. Prior to the 13th century, the epic was an oral tradition, but it later appeared in written form. While it may be only legend, Gotland is unquestionably historically rich, and a certain air of mystery prevails.

POINTS OF INTEREST

In each port of call, there are many interesting sights. While we try to include the main points, our listing is by no means exhaustive.

OLD VISBY

Visby's city wall is one of northern Europe's oldest. Its 40 towers are intact and have helped earn the city a place on the list of UNESCO's *World Heritage Sites*. The two-mile wall encircles the city, and is the longest of its kind. The original was erected in the 13th century, but it has been re-built many times throughout its long history. Efforts to preserve it are ongoing.

Inside the fortifications, the street plan dates back to the 13th century, and was modeled on the layout of the original Viking settlement. Main streets lead from the gates to the port in true medieval fashion – none follow straight lines. The twisting pattern was designed to thwart would-be attackers – citizens knew the layout of their city, but invaders would soon get lost in the labyrinth. The streets, of varying widths, are paved with limestone, stones and granite.

The city's enormous cathedral dominates the eastern side. There are a number of old homes in the district as well as some fine old limestone warehouses that were restored in the 18th century. The remains of more than a dozen smaller churches can also be found in the area.

FORNSAL MUSEUM

The ancient relics at the Fornsal Museum are unique, and include Runic (picture) stones and a fine Viking silver collection. There are art, natural history, and ecology departments. An ongoing education program, and the Fenomenalen technology exhibition for children and young

people round out the foundation's program. The oldest artifacts in the museum are more than 8,000 years old. The collection opens daily from 11am to 6pm.

RAUKARNA

Scattered around the island are the eerie limestone formations known as raukarna. The craggy pillars once lined the coast. The largest remaining concentration of them can be found on the eastern side. Fanciful forms have been assigned to the unusual shapes, which are thought to have formed eons ago when much of the island was submerged. One of the most famous is Hoburgsgubben (Old Man of Hoburg), one of the stone trolls about which there are many tales. Also on the East Coast, most of Gotland's best beaches are found. Holland America Line does not endorse swimming or marine sporting activities. The sea is unpredictable and characteristically strong currents flow past certain parts of the island. Never swim alone.

ANCIENT AND HISTORIC SITES

There are more than 1,000 recognized historical sites and monuments on Gotland. Most are marked, and with few exceptions, they are always open at no charge.

Botulf Katlund built Katlund's farm in the Middle Ages. The perfectly preserved property is his legacy and offers visitors a glimpse at period lifestyles. How could society have possibly survived without telephones or computers?

STORA KARLSÖ

Stora Karlsö, a small but very special island, is located just off Gotland's west coast. The boat from Klintehamn takes 40 minutes in one direction. One of the island's main attractions is its lighthouse, which offers a splendid view of the coast-

line. There are also some caves in which Stone Age relics were discovered. Bird fanciers can find a large colony of nesting seabirds, especially during breeding season.

Visitors can enjoy lunch or dinner at the island's only restaurant. There is also a small inn for overnight visitors. Due to time considerations, Holland America Line recommends that guests planning to visit the island independently allow plenty of time for return in order to be back aboard ship in time for sailing.

BUNGE OPEN-AIR MUSEUM

Bunge open-air museum is one of the most interesting sites on the island. Just west of Fårösund at the military zone, the complex is one of Sweden's largest outdoor museums. More than 50 buildings have been preserved and transported to the site from other parts of Gotland. Several fine pre-Viking era *rune* stones are displayed. The site opens daily between June and August. Bunge is also home to an excellent 14th-century fortress church.

FARÖ

Fårösund, on the northern tip of Gotland, is the center of a restricted military zone, but it is still accessible via the main road if governmental permission is obtained prior to arrival. Just across a narrow channel, the separate island of Fårö is a place seemingly forgotten by time. The landscape is dotted with 17th-century farms and life continues in an undisturbed leisurely pace in sharp contrast to the relative bustle of Visby. The island is a rural and charming place. Most of the visitors are Swedes who go there for the small island's pretty beaches and dramatic rocky coast.

SHOPPING TIPS

The unit of currency in Sweden is the krona (crown). One krona is divided into 100 öre. The krona is a stable currency, and Sweden is a member of the European Economic Community.

In addition to the other wonderful Swedish products that are available, such as clothing and shoes, crystal and glass lovers will have a delightful time shopping in Visby. Several famous glass and crystal works are available, including Kosta Boda, where interesting and often whimsical designs are created and Orrefors, designer of elegant crystal objects. Also look for traditional carved wooden Dalahäst horses from the Dalarna province, or wool clothing items. You may also see amber in town. The precious fossil is often found along the shores of the Baltic. Swedish goldsmiths produce excellent work. Look for the stamp showing three crowns, indicating minimum content of 18 carats.

ARRIVAL INFORMATION

The ship anchors off Visby. Continuous tender service operates between the ship and shore. Taxis are available near the tender landing, but they tend to be pricey. Most drivers accept major credit cards.

Gotlands Turistservice, the official visitor information office at Donnersplats in Visby opens daily until 7:00pm during the height of summer. Otherwise, it is open weekdays until 5:00pm and weekends until 4:00pm.

HOTELS AND RESTAURANTS

Try some fresh salmon or other fresh fish. The Swedish smörgåsbord is usually a good value and offers an opportunity to sample various local dishes. Prices have dropped in recent years in Sweden although alcoholic beverages are still taxed at a very high rate. Private cars and drivers may be available. Inquire 48 hours prior to arrival. Private arrangements are subject to cancellation and communication fees.

LANGUAGE

Public signs and business signs are in Swedish, but most people also understand English and German.
